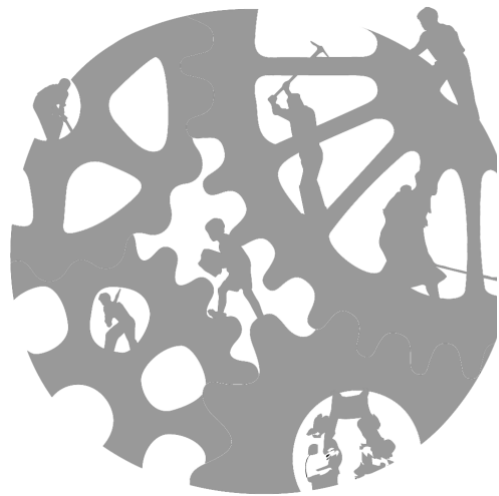


4.1: Introducing week four
